

Remember Who You Are

I love the movie *The Lion King*. There are many moments and scenes that stay with me, but one in particular stands out. It is when the baboon Rafiki takes young Simba back to the lagoon to show him his father, Mufasa. Simba peers into the water of the lagoon and sees the reflection of himself. Simba complains that it isn't his father, it's just a reflection of himself. Rafiki says "look harder, he lives in you." When Simba looks again he hears the voice of his father saying: "Simba, you have forgotten who you are, you are more than you have become. Remember who you are..."

This month begins the season of Lent. In the long history of the church, Lent has been a time when people prepared for baptism. In the early church, Lent served as a 40 day intensive retreat for adults who were preparing to be baptized at the Easter vigil. We baptize and reaffirm our baptismal covenant (BCP p. 304 & 305) at Easter. Baptism reminds us who we are, beloved children of God, made in God's image and likeness and called to treat each other as brothers and sisters. When we look in the pond or in the mirror or in the waters of the baptismal font we see a reflection of God. We are God's handiwork. When we see God in our imperfect, incomplete selves, we can more easily see God in our imperfect, incomplete neighbor.

This is not always easy, especially in our world today. Everywhere we turn there are personal attacks, distinctions between "us" (good) people and "them" (bad) people, racism, sexism, classism, homophobia, etc. etc. etc. Whole countries and peoples are labeled and excluded. Anger and fear swirl all around us. All of this diminishes and reduces us and it diminishes and reduces other people. Like young Simba, these forces cause us to forget who we are.

In the story of Jesus' baptism (Mark 1: 9-11) we are told that "just as he (Jesus) was coming out of the water... a voice came from heaven, "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased." The waters of baptism reminded Jesus of who he was and they inspired him to live that love all the way to the cross and resurrection, loving the rejects and outcasts every step of the way. Peer into the water of baptism and hear God saying: "remember who you are..."

UPDATE FROM ANNIE HENNINGER

My friends,

On a Sunday this past August I had the opportunity to worship with you if only briefly. My visit was a homecoming, for St. Paul's is still my spiritual home, the place that nurtured and supported my call to ordained ministry.

It's hard to believe that I (we) have begun our eighth year on the easternmost part of the Rosebud Reservation. This call began with my ministry first in Duluth, MN as part of the Feather Meets the Cross ministry and then the call to South Dakota to minister as priest with the Lakota people. I have never had second thoughts about my ministry for I have discovered a family among the people whom I serve. I began with three churches: All Saint's, Milkscamp, is a small church tucked in a valley in the middle of a pasture where horses and cattle graze. St. Andrews, Bonesteel, was a small congregation, a handful of members which unfortunately closed during my second year of ministry due to the age of the members and the lack of funds to continue. It was a painful decision for the members as well as myself. Calvary, Okreek is the 3rd Church of my original call. It is the farthest west and is located on the east end of the Rosebud reservation proper. Six months into my ministry upon the retirement of the priest serving it, Incarnation, Gregory was added to the Rosebud East Episcopal Mission. Each of these churches are located in south-central South Dakota along Highway 18. About 3 years ago, Trinity, Winner and All Saint's Ideal were added to the churches I serve after the priest serving there retired and moved to the East Coast. We are truly a Mission Diocese for a great part of the population of this diocese is Native American. Clergy are spread thin and most of us travel great distances between the churches we serve. I generally average at least 1000 miles a month travel just for Sunday services. As you might guess it is impossible to celebrate Eucharist at each church every Sunday. I alternate between the eastern churches, Gregory and Milkscamp on the 1st and 3rd Sundays and Okreek, Winner and Ideal on the 2nd and 4th Sundays.

Baptisms are celebrated throughout the year but Christmas and Easter seem to be the primary baptismal times. It's the grandmas who make sure their grandchildren receive the Sacrament. I've baptized as many as 9, adults and children at one service, what a delight! Sadly there are many deaths on the Reservation. Most of the burials are of young people in their 30's and 40's and of people younger than 60. Diseases like diabetes and alcoholism as well as accidents and suicide are the primary causes of death. Each funeral involves one or two night wakes where the family members keep vigil with the body of the deceased and the funerals themselves are done in a dignified manner where the pall-bearers lower the casket into the ground and shovel the dirt to cover the grave. It is an honor to me that I am able to celebrate their funeral liturgies and to be part of the family's grief over their loved ones.

I consider myself blessed for having been called by God to this ministry. In nourishing the body and souls of others in Eucharist I have been fed. I look forward to continuing this ministry for as long as God allows.

Those of you who read this, know that you have been and are part of this ministry. I have been blessed with people who have been a source of strength and encouragement. There are many challenges in this ministry and life itself but I know that I am not alone for you are supporting me continually in prayer.

Dear friends in Christ,

A well-known preacher created an acronym for Lent: Let's eliminate negative thinking. I suppose it was effective because I still remember it decades later, but. . . no. Lent isn't about negative thinking. It's about recognizing that God is in charge, and we're not. In order to do that, we must acknowledge our humanity, that we are made from dust and that we will return to dust. During Lent, we immerse ourselves in God's grace, revealed in Jesus whom God raised from the dead. From the outside, it probably looks like Lent is a negative time. The liturgy is sparse, and we put away singing and saying, "Alleluia," for forty days. This is not to create a somber mood or to beat up on ourselves. It is to create space for God to come into our lives with the wondrous love of Jesus Christ. Walk the journey with us.

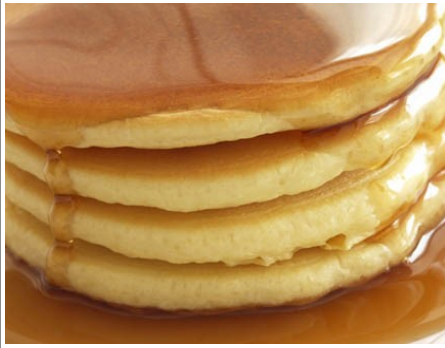

Support group discussion with focus

After viewing the video, you and the other group members will spend time as a support group, discussing what was presented in that week's video seminar and what is going on in your lives.

Personal study and reflection

During the week you will have the opportunity to use your workbook for further personal study of the grieving process and to help sort out your emotions through journaling. Your group will spend time discussing questions and comments from the workbook study.
