They said nothing to anyone...

At a recent conference on evangelism our Presiding Bishop Michael Curry told a story about when he was bishop in North Carolina. He was scheduled to do a parish visitation that included baptisms and confirmations on September 11, 2001. After the attacks on the World Trade Center that morning, Bishop Curry phoned the rector of the parish to discuss what they should do. Should they go ahead with the service as planned or do something else in light of the events of the morning? After some discussion, the rector recommended that they go ahead with the service as planned because "we need to baptize and confirm tonight. We need all the baptized followers of Jesus we can get…"

This Easter Sunday, we hear the account of Jesus' resurrection from the Gospel of Mark (16: 1-8). Mark's is the briefest and most puzzling of all the resurrection stories. It tells us that the women went to the tomb "very early on the first day of the week" worried about who would roll away the stone from the entrance of the tomb. Upon arrival, they see that the stone has already been moved. Upon entering the tomb, they do not find Jesus' body but rather a young man "dressed in a white robe" who tells them that Jesus has been raised and they should "go, tell his disciples... that (Jesus) is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him..." This is followed by Mark's famous last line: "So they went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them, and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid."

What? How can this be? If they "said nothing to anyone" how did the others hear the Good News of Jesus' resurrection? How did it spread? If they kept it to themselves, it would have died with them. This can't be the end, because it would be the end of the story.

I believe Mark's purpose in concluding the gospel in fear and silence, is to say "it's up to you." It's up to us. Mark is telling us that if we stay silent the power of Jesus' resurrection, the power of God's love, is lost. But if we live out our baptismal promises to proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ, and if we seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving our neighbor as ourselves and if we strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being, the love of God in Christ Jesus grows and spreads.

The message of the young man in the tomb that Easter morning was "Jesus lives." Nothing can overcome God's love, not hate, or fear, or the cross, or acts of terrorism. It's up to us, baptized followers of Jesus, to go out and tell the world this great Good News of the transforming power of God's love.

ST. PAUL'S HISTORY

Our March GIFT event was a tour of St. Paul's where we explored the history and hidden spaces. It was wildly popular and will be repeated next year as we celebrate the 150th Anniversary of St. Paul's in 2019. Each month in the Messenger, we will share snippets of the tour. This month we start with the beginning of St. Paul's and the location of the original document forming the parish.

"Duluth in the early 1860's had about 12 families that joined the Native American population living on Minnesota Point. They began meeting in homes and the first Episcopal Church service was held on August 5, 1868 by Bishop Whipple (the first Bishop of Minnesota). Two and a half years later, it was announced that the honorable Jay Cooke of Philadelphia (a member of St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Cheltenham, PA) commissioned the building of "a fair sized church for worship according to Episcopal forms in Duluth, MN." Jay Cooke was a wealthy industrialist interested in extending the Northern Pacific Railroad into the Northwest.

No church building of any kind had yet been built in the city, so work soon began on the first church in Duluth, St. Paul's Episcopal on Lake Avenue and 2nd Street. Visiting priests from the East Coast held services in the schoolhouse; until the first service was held in the new church on Christmas Day 1869. On October 20, 1870 Bishop Whipple signed documents giving his consent to the organization of the parish; named St. Paul's after St. Paul's Church in Cheltenham, PA, whose members were among the largest contributors to the building fund in Duluth."

That original document hangs outside the parish office!

EPISCOPAL CHURCH GENERAL CONVENTION

EPISCOPAL CHURCH GENERAL CONVENTION OFFICIAL YOUTH PRESENCE MEMBERS ANNOUNCED

The 16 members of the Episcopal Church General Convention Official Youth Presence at the 79th General Convention have been announced. The 79th General Convention of the Episcopal Church will be held July 5 to 13, in Austin, Texas. The General Convention Official Youth Presence was established by an initial resolution in 1982. Members of the Official Youth Presence are permitted seat and voice by the rules of the House of Deputies and will participate in committee hearings and floor debates.

"Each convention since 1997, the Official Youth Presence has had the privilege of seat and voice in the House of Deputies," House of Deputies President Gay Clark Jennings said. "Our legislative deliberations and debates are enlivened and enriched by these impressive young people, and I look forward to welcoming this year's participants to our house." Members of the Official Youth Presence will participate in a General Convention orientation and training April 5-8 in Austin to ensure they are ready for General Convention when they arrive in Texas on July 2," noted Bronwyn Clark Skov, Episcopal Church Director for Formation, Youth and Young Adult Ministries. "These young people will participate in every aspect of General Convention, from committee meetings to legislative deliberations on the floor of the House of Deputies, where they are granted both seat and voice."

We are excited to announce that Luisa Van Oss, from St. Paul's was chosen as 1 of the 2 delegates from Province VI which includes Colorado, Iowa, Minnesota, Montana, Nebraska, North and South Dakota and Wyoming.

The Formation Department received 107 applications from youth in dioceses across the Episcopal Church. Applications were reviewed by a committee that included House of Deputies Vice-President Byron Rushing of Massachusetts, Deputy Ariana Gonzalez Bonillas of Arizona, members of the Youth Ministry Network Leadership Council and the Formation Department staff.

The Episcopal Church's General Convention is held every three years to consider the legislative business of the church. General Convention is the bicameral governing body of the Church, comprised of the House of Bishops, with upwards of 200 active and retired bishops, and the House of Deputies, with clergy and lay deputies elected from the 109 dioceses and three regional areas of the Church, at more than 800 members. Between Conventions, the General Convention continues to work through its committees and commissions. The Executive Council of the Episcopal Church carries out the programs and policies adopted by General Convention.

WHAT HAPPENS TO THE BIRTHDAY MONEY?

It is the custom here at St. Paul's when you are celebrating a birthday or anniversary to come up to the altar to receive a blessing while the congregation supports you by praying a special prayer while the clergy individually bless each person. In their hands, they have a tin can in which people can place coins or bills in thanksgiving to God for another year of life, love and happiness. Many people place a penny, dime or dollar for each year of their birthday or anniversary. But have you ever wondered what happens to that blessing money? It is put into a special Birthday/Anniversary Children's Fund that is not just tucked away; it is used each year to pay for all the "extras" that make our projects and events in our Christian Formation Program so special and would otherwise not be able to be covered by the budget. By contributing in honor of your birthday or anniversary, you are helping provide for many fun, faith-filled activities like the picnic lunch on Rally Day, a field trip to thank our acolytes, festivals like the popular Advent Around the World and so much more! 
