



Reclaiming Jesus

On my long car rides to visit my father, I sometimes listen to “Christian” radio stations. They often make me cringe. Much of what is proclaimed is moralistic and judgmental. They employ a literal reading of the Bible without recognition of culture and context. They paint a picture of an angry God who’s out to get you. They wag their finger at people who are different.

So I found it refreshing to encounter “Reclaiming Jesus: A Confession of Faith in a Time of Crisis.” This document is the work of our presiding bishop, Michael Curry, and Jim Wallis of Sojourners and has been signed by more than 20 Christian leaders. (reclaimingjesus.org) It states plainly what it means to be a follower of Jesus today, and presents a very different Christianity than what one hears in the media.

Here’s a summary of **Reclaiming Jesus**:

“We are living through perilous and polarizing times as a nation, with a dangerous crisis of moral and political leadership at the highest levels of our government and in our churches. We believe the soul of the nation and the integrity of faith are now at stake.

It is time to be followers of Jesus before anything else—nationality, political party, race, ethnicity, gender, geography—our identity in Christ precedes every other identity. We pray that our nation will see Jesus’ words in us. ‘By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another’ (John 13:35).

I. WE BELIEVE each human being is made in God’s image and likeness (Genesis 1:26). That image and likeness confers a divinely decreed dignity, worth, and God-given equality to all of us as children of the one God who is the Creator of all things. Racial bigotry is a brutal denial of the image of God (the *imago dei*) in some of the children of God.

THEREFORE, WE REJECT the resurgence of white nationalism and racism in our nation on many fronts, including the highest levels of political leadership. We, as followers of Jesus, must clearly reject the use of racial bigotry for political gain that we have seen. In the face of such bigotry, silence is complicity.

II. WE BELIEVE we are one body. In Christ, there is to be no oppression based on race, gender, identity, or class (Galatians 3:28). The body of Christ, where those great human divisions are to be overcome, is meant to be an example for the rest of society.

THEREFORE, WE REJECT misogyny, the mistreatment, violent abuse, sexual harassment, and assault of women that has been further revealed in our culture and politics, including our churches, and the oppression of any other child of God.

III. WE BELIEVE how we treat the hungry, the thirsty, the naked, the stranger, the sick, and the prisoner is how we treat Christ himself. (Matthew 25: 31-46) ‘Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me.’

THEREFORE, WE REJECT the language and policies of political leaders who would debase and abandon the most vulnerable children of God. We strongly deplore the growing attacks on immigrants and refugees, who are being made into cultural and political targets, and we need to remind our churches that God makes the treatment of the ‘strangers’ among us a test of faith (Leviticus 19:33-34).

IV. WE BELIEVE that truth is morally central to our personal and public lives. Truth-telling is central to the prophetic biblical tradition, whose vocation includes speaking the Word of God into their societies and speaking the truth to power.

THEREFORE, WE REJECT the practice and pattern of lying that is invading our political and civil life.

V. WE BELIEVE that Christ's way of leadership is servanthood, not domination.

THEREFORE, WE REJECT any moves toward autocratic political leadership and authoritarian rule. We believe authoritarian political leadership is a theological danger that threatens democracy and the common good.

VI. WE BELIEVE Jesus when he tells us to go into all nations making disciples (Matthew 28:18). Our churches and our nations are part of an international community whose interests always surpass national boundaries.

THEREFORE, WE REJECT 'America first' as a theological heresy for followers of Christ. While we share a patriotic love for our country, we reject xenophobic or ethnic nationalism that places one nation over others as a political goal.

WE ARE DEEPLY CONCERNED for the soul of our nation, but also for our churches and the integrity of our faith. The present crisis calls us to go deeper—deeper into our relationship to God; deeper into our relationships with each other, especially across racial, ethnic, and national lines; deeper into our relationships with the most vulnerable, who are at greatest risk.”

That is just a summary of “Reclaiming Jesus” (reclaimingjesus.org). I HIGHLY encourage you to read it in its entirety. We must always remember that we are followers of Jesus before anything else. These six statements of belief give us a roadmap.

From the Archives of
Saint Paul's Episcopal Church
 Where Long Forgotten History,
 Breathes New Life

LADIES' GUILD GIVES SUPPER

**First Social Gathering for Men at
 St. Paul's Episcopal Church
 Takes Place.**

**100 MEN MEMBERS
 OF CHURCH ATTEND**

**W. J. Olcott, Toastmaster, Hopes
 Activities Will Extend Over
 Seven Days Instead of One.**

The first social gathering for men at the new **St. Paul's Episcopal** church, a supper given last evening by the Ladies' guild of the church, was attended by about 100 men of the congregation. Supper was served by 20 of the guild members, at five tables, decorated with spring flowers and candles, each table in a different shade.

William J. Olcott who acted as toastmaster during the smoker which followed the supper, and in his introductory talk that, now that the splendid new building opened opportunities, the activity of the church as an organization should be extended over seven days instead of one, and so increase sevenfold.

George A. **St. Clair** paid a graceful tribute to the women of the guild for their hospitality in inaugurating the social life of the church and taking the first steps to make it a living influence in the community. He also spoke in terms of praise of the men whose generous zeal had made possible the building of the new church.

Dr. A. W. Ryan characterized modern Christianity as the union of work for one's fellowman with spiritual worship, and spoke of the increased sense of individual responsibility for the community, which is the keynote of the new century. With a strong and efficient organization of both men

and women, he said, **St. Paul's** could hope to do much, not only for its members, but for the community as well.

A luncheon for women of the congregation given in January was the first of the social gatherings at the new church, and other affairs of a similar nature will be given with the completion of the church building.

This article appeared in the Duluth News Tribune on February 5, 1913. Over the next year, Bob Silverness will be submitting pieces from the archives.
