



Happy Anniversary St. Paul's!

I have spent some time in our church archives the past few months. Bob Silverness has been doing a great job organizing the archives, and I have enjoyed looking through newspaper articles, newsletters, minutes and artifacts. What I have enjoyed the most are the pictures.



I love one picture in particular. It is taken from the stage in the parish hall. Rows and rows of ladies (except for one man in the front, probably the rector) are seated at long tables. There are more than 150 ladies packed in, all dressed up, wearing hats, seated at the tables. Written on the back is "Meeting of Guild Auxiliary, Nov. 11, 1936."

The picture is a reminder that church has been, and always will be, a place to gather. Church is a place where people come together to pray, worship, learn, explore, question and grow in love for God and each other. How we gather has changed over time. There is no longer a Guild Auxiliary, but our church calendar is filled with opportunities to come together for learning, fellowship, service and worship. Our primary gathering takes place every Sunday morning. We also have a vibrant Wednesday Church Night community that gathers for worship, a meal and programs and activities for all ages.

This month, we have a number of special gatherings for our anniversary celebration. Our GIFT night on October 23rd will have anniversary activities for all ages. Friday, October 25th there is a Gala Dinner at Greysolon Plaza. The Venerable Canon Ben Scott, church historian, storyteller, and recent recipient of the Whipple Cross, will give a talk entitled: "Who will be sitting in my pew...?" Please sign up on the website or by calling the church office.

On Saturday the 26th there will be a history walk, tours of the church, children's activities and a historic tea in the parish hall. On Sunday, Archbishop Mark MacDonald, son of St. Paul's and archbishop for the National Indigenous Anglican Church of Canada will deliver the sermon. This service will be followed by a festive coffee hour.

Hmong Refugee Ministry: 1981-1987

"Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for thereby some have entertained angels unaware."

-- Hebrews 13:1-2


The memories of those of us who participated in this work are hazy, but the interest and inspiration it generated remain. These efforts began during the tenure of Rector Robert Hardman, at a Social Justice Committee meeting in the House Next Door apartment of Curate Mark MacDonald (now an Archbishop of the Anglican Church of Canada). Those discussions led to a presentation by Penny Baumgarten to the congregation and a vote to sponsor a family. Shortly Plia Her, a Hmong woman in her mid forties, arrived with her children in Duluth.

Lutheran Social Services (LSS) had then been helping settle Hmong refugees in Minnesota since 1980. though earlier refugees (and their families) all of whom had served as scouts for US military in Laos, had come in the late 70's to Maryland and central California. Thousands of Hmong died because they had been US allies. Duluth Roman Catholic and Lutheran churches also sponsored families. Over the next two years several more families, were sponsored by St. Paul's. Many volunteers were involved teaching these new friends how to navigate their new lives, after spending their lives as subsistence farmers in the mountains of Laos. And there was in the beginning little complex understanding of the courage it took to walk through the dangerous terrain of Laos and Thailand toward the refugee camps where many spent years waiting for sponsors, in order to come to the United States.

Beverly Harries and Terry Roberts spearheaded these efforts from the beginning. From the first arrival they gathered volunteers in this effort that included taking refugees for medical visits, arranging housing, helping with food and other shopping, and arranging English lessons and tutoring. Initially there was no skilled interpretation from LSS until Lee Sengthau arrived in 1983, who spoke Hmong, Lao, and Thai.

In October of 1983 the "Hmong Crafts" shop opened in the Sun Room of the House Next Door, supported by LSS. This was again a "many hands" effort, hoping to empower the Hmong women. Several families lived by this time on upper floors of the HND. Every Thursday women sewed in the spacious basement downstairs, and various projects including Hmong embroidery were considered and tried out within skirts, dresses, etc. by a group of volunteers from St. Paul's that included Carolyn Russell, Susan Anderson, Kate Skelton, Judy Gustafson, Penny Baumgarten, Marty Moeller, Bev, Terry and others. We were beyond pleased when "Port Cities Magazine" featured a won-

derful front cover of Plia Her and Pang Kou with Bill Boyce, director of the Tweed Museum, (of St. Andrew's on Park Point) all standing in front of an impressive Hmong Needlework piece. The shop was a success in that the women earned money and within several years they learned (with some humor) what Americans liked to buy and learned to market their beautiful work independently. Our shop volunteers were mainly from St. Paul's, but also included several from Holy Rosary and other churches.



By 1987, most of Duluth's refugee families had moved to live near extended family and other work opportunities in Minneapolis-St Paul. We had learned a great deal – about an ancient culture, an exquisite art form, not to mention a different kind of courage. However, my memory of those days with the Hmong women, sitting and sewing with their infants in elaborately sewn wraps on their backs, is the laughter and joy we shared.

Many thanks to Terry Roberts, Bev Harries, Susan Anderson, Marty Moeller, Joel Bamford, Kate Skelton, and Lee Sengthau. This summary is far from complete, but gives an idea of what happened in those years.

Church Nights in October

Wednesday Church Nights have some exciting offerings this month. Church Nights have become the centerpiece of our Christian Formation program and include something for everyone. The adult programs for Church Night will focus on health, wellness and safety this month.

Our 5:30 pm Eucharist is held in church. This is a great way to attend service if you are not able to make it on Sunday (or even if you are able!). We gather in the front pews. Tom Hamilton leads our music on the piano. This service is less formal and shorter than Sunday. We use the scripture readings for the coming Sunday.

Buffy Helstrom (and friends) prepare our simple suppers that begin at 6:00. Buffy does a wonderful job preparing a simple, healthy meal that we ask you to help support by making a donation toward defraying the cost. Check out the menu in this edition of the Messenger.

Church Nights meet three times per month with programming from 6:30-7:30pm. Two Wednesdays, the children and youth have age- specific faith formation for grades pre-K through Confirmation. Faith formation is life-long, so adults have the opportunity to engage in programs, speakers and discussions on various topics. Please let me know if you have suggestions for speakers or programs.

One Wednesday we will be together for GIFT; Growing in Faith Together, which gives a chance for all ages to **engage** in fun faith activities together. We will have one Wednesday where we don't gather at church, instead that time can be used for focusing on faith at home. On the months where there are 5 Wednesdays, our church leaves the building and engages in a service project somewhere in our community.

October Church Night Adult Programs:

Our focus for October, November and December is: Health, Wellness and Safety.

October 2 – Tracie Clanaugh, will speak to us about **First Witness**, where she is executive director. First Witness Child Advocacy Center is a safe, child-friendly place for victims of child sexual and physical abuse to tell their story. They provide child-appropriate forensic interviews, crisis counseling to children and families and age-appropriate education on personal body safety for children. First Witness believes every child deserves ongoing safety and opportunities to heal from abuse.



Called to Teach Meditation



A year ago a feeling was growing in me that I was receiving so much from my church and returning so little. How to serve became a lingering question. This question led to an inventory of my talents; which led to the realization that I'm good at meditating. So I mentioned the idea to Rev. Barb Elliott that I would be willing to lead a mediation group at St. Paul's if there was interest. She mentioned this idea to the staff at St. Paul's. Shortly after, Director of Christian Formation Sue Van Oss asked if I'd be willing to teach meditation to the youth in faith formation classes. My first reaction was to think, "That's not what I had in mind. I've never taught mediation to children. Can I do that?"

Fortunately, I had been hearing Barb and Bill preach about "callings" and so I wondered, "Is this what I'm being called to do?" Do ordinary people like me receive call-

ings? In Rev. Bill Van Oss's June-July 2019 Messenger writing he assures us that people like me do receive Everyday Callings. So perhaps that's what I experienced in the fall of 2019. Through the encouragement and support of Sue Van Oss, the faith formation guides, and the St. Paul's staff, I was given the opportunity to contribute my little bit of mediation teachings to the Wednesday night faith formation classes. It's been a wonderful experience for me. I've gained more than I've given, I'm sure. I've had so much fun laughing with the children as I learn to teach them meditation. My first challenge was to select the meditations that would be easily adapted to children; and then to infuse those mediations with the Way of Love message consistent with their faith formation curriculum of Love Neighbor, Love Self, and Love God. I found that in order to teach something means that I need to understand it better myself. So I have benefited from understanding the Way of Love more thoroughly . I have also been able to observe how the faith guides have creatively used this Way of Love faith formation curriculum to bring this concept alive in these children. I am so grateful that I was called and supported in this endeavor.
