



#### **Everyday Callings**

For just over a year, we have been working on "creating a culture of calling" here at St. Paul's. We received a grant and training from the Vibrant Faith initiative that gives us ideas and resources on calling. We kicked it off last October with a weekend of events with Laura Fanucci from the Collegeville Institute. Our theme for the year was "Called to the Way of Love" (combining calling with our national church's focus on the way of love). Some of our Wednesday Church Nights focused on calling. We had a staff day of reflection on calling. Our formation programs focused on calling in various ways throughout the year. There were newsletter articles, sermons and a youth retreat on calling.



I have also had conversations with individuals and in small groups about

calling. The thing that I have encountered over and over is people wondering if they have ever been called. I've heard "I don't think I've ever been given a calling" over and over...

I think this happens because we believe that a calling is a "lightning bolt" moment, God's voice from the sky telling us what we are to do with the rest of our life. There are some famous Bible stories that depict calling in this way. This can happen, but most often, I believe, our callings are much more ordinary.

I recently spent time with my 93-year-old father. I asked him what he enjoys most now that his health limits some of the things he can do. He said he loves helping out at his church, volunteering at the St. Vincent DePaul Society and taking care of his garden (the fruits of which he mostly gives away). I wondered out loud if these things might be his "callings" at this stage of his life. He looked at me quizzically, as if to say "but they're so ordinary."

Theologian Michael Himes lifts up the importance of joy, talents and service in discerning our callings. He asks three questions: Is it a source of joy? Does it tap into your talents and gifts? Is it of genuine service to the people around you and to society at large? Callings are not always extraordinary, life-changing things. They are often simple things like organizing music sheets, sorting donations and growing vegetables for the neighbors. I know someone who tenderly cares for her aging dog, and another who devotes herself to discouraging the use of single-use plastic products like straws and grocery bags. Callings? I believe so.

We will continue our focus on "creating a culture of calling" here at St. Paul's. Hopefully, as we continue to teach, pray and reflect on this important part of the Christian life, you will see and know that God's callings are all around you, mostly in ordinary things.

Starting in August, the Messenger will feature a parishioner sharing their story of everyday callings. If you would like to share your story, please let me know.



#### SAFE CHURCH TRAINING

#### What is Safe Church Policy?

In our Baptismal Covenant, we promise to respect the dignity of every human being. One way that we live out that value in the Episcopal Church in Minnesota is through the implementation of our Safe Church Policies. These policies establish and maintain standards intended to ensure that our faith communities are safe places where all of God's people are loved and encouraged to grow into the people God calls us to be. These policies provide specific recommendations, best practices, and guidelines that seek to protect children, youth, and vulnerable adults.

The Safe Church Policies were recently updated in April of 2019 at the urging of the General Convention of the Episcopal Church. These updated policies and training materials now include best practices for: facility safety, current child protection research, the needs of vulnerable adults, support for LGBTQ and gender non-binary persons, awareness of diverse sensory needs, off-site and overnight programming, camp and retreat centers, social media and other communication practices.

ECMN now has three (3) distinct tiers of training. Each tier can be completed in person with an ECMN-certified trainer or online. Sue Van Oss will become a certified trainer at the end of June and will be offering several trainings in the coming months.

#### Tier 1. Universal Training

Summary: Each faith community is required to offer this one-hour community-wide training annually that provides a broad overview of all policies with attention to how to create a safe, healthy and transformational faith community. This will be offered at one of our Wednesday Church Nights in the fall.

#### Tier 2. Safe Church for God's Children

Summary: Tier Two is a three-hour foundational training for anyone who has keys to the church building and/or is in ministry with children, youth, or vulnerable adults.

## Tuesday, August 6 at 6 pm, or Sunday, August 25 at 11 am will be the first two dates this will be offered. You can attend either session; both will be held in the children's room.

Tier 3. Safe Church for God's People is additional training for staff and clergy, who are involved in managing ministries for youth and adults alike. It discusses the power dynamics present in pastoral relationships and how to prevent sexual harassment and exploitation.

#### **BISHOP SEARCH UPDATE**

The Bishop Search Committee has now gathered information from around the state. People were invited to submit an online survey and were invited to attend meetings around the state. From this input the Search Committee is now putting together our profile of who we are, the Episcopal Church in Minnesota.

On June 24, 2019 the Profile for Bishop will be posted and nominations open. August 3, 2019 is the nomination deadline.

The candidates' materials and reference checks will take place from August 10 to September 6, 2019. Interviews of prospective candidates will take place starting on August 12, 2019. There is a discernment retreat where the Search Committee will forward a slate of three to five candidate names to the Standing Committee.

By November 22 the slate of candidates will be announced.

January 12, 2020 will begin a week of Walkabout with the candidates. The candidates will visit sites throughout the state. This is a chance for anyone to attend. You can meet and listen to the slate of prospective Bishops.

January 25, 2020 the voting will take place at the Election Convention.

On June 6, 2020 the 10th Bishop of Minnesota will be consecrated by the Presiding Bishop. All are welcome to this wonderful event.

#### NOTES OF A DIFFERENT KIND....

Sisters and brothers in Christ:

As you may know, my father died in early April. It was a long time coming, but when it happened, the landscape changed drastically. Even when we think we are prepared for the inevitable outcome, the sense of anticipation was replaced by profound sadness.

The last time I visited my dad when he could converse was two years ago. Since he was still able to walk on his own, I took him out for lunch. I didn't realize how far he his memory had slipped until we were being seated, and he asked me, "How's your Dad?" My immediate response was, "He's doing great!" From there we talked about a lot of things, but very little of the conversation made much sense, but, nonetheless, it was great conversation. I took him back to the nursing home and headed for Duluth. The drive home was very emotional as I realized the things that made him my Dad were gone. However, comfort came remembering his sense of humor. He loved to tell jokes and was very good at it. He also easily laughed at himself. With that in mind, I imagined him outside himself watching our lunch conversation and seeing the humor in his absent-mindedness. Of course, it's sad when someone experiences loss like his, but I truly believe that he would have relished the random thoughts with grace and humor. (An aside: my sister called the next day. She had been to visit him, and he told her about the nice lunch he had with this guy. "I don't know who he was, but he sure was a nice guy.")

At his memorial service, we processed to *For All the Saints*. Being surrounded by such sounds was moving beyond belief. I knew that I would never be able to sing the high E on the Alleluia because of my tight throat choking back tears. However, the congregation sustained the sound and held me up when I was unable to sing. Such is the great gift of music in community.

Brad, my nephew and former student, played the organ for the service. I was so very proud of him. It was comforting to be able to sit with my children and sing with my family around me. He played my favorite Bach fugue for the postlude. With the doors of the church wide open, the music rang through the neighborhood as we stood outside the church awaiting military honors. In the silence after he released the last chord, someone inside the church shouted, "Amen!" Amen indeed.

Thank you all for your love and support during this difficult time. I was moved and comforted to see the plant sent by St. Paul's for the service. I am blessed to be surrounded by such a great community of faith.
